
Background to the Report


According to the 2022 Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI) survey report obtained from the Nigerian Bureau of Statistics (NBS), approximately 63% of Nigeria's population (around 133 million people) experience multidimensional poverty. The National MPI is 0.257, indicating that poor people in Nigeria experience just over one-quarter of all possible deprivations.


The report reveals significant regional disparities, with approximately 65% of the poor population (around 86 million people) residing in the North, while about 35% (around 47 million) live in the South. Poverty levels across states vary significantly, ranging from 27% in Ondo to 91% in Sokoto.

Nationally, significant deprivations are observed in sanitation, access to healthcare, food insecurity, and housing. According to the report, 40.1% of the population lives below the national monetary poverty line (2018/19), while 63% experience multidimensional poverty (National MPI 2022).

Multidimensional poverty is higher in rural areas, where 72% of people are poor, compared to 42% of people in urban areas.

DATA ANALYSIS



STEP 01

General Poverty Rate:

Approximately 38.9% of the population lived below the national poverty line, equating to about 77.9 million people in 2019

- There was an appreciable poverty rate increase by 2020 to around 42.3%, representing about 84 million of the population. By 2021, the rate was estimated at 43.1%, with the impacts of COVID-19 escalating the economic conditions.
- From 44.2% in 2022, the poverty rate approximately jumped to 45.1% in 2023, according to
 estimates from various organizations. Driven by inflation and economic instability, and due to
 the government's faulty economic policies, it is estimated that the rate might continue the
 upward trend.



STEP 02

Impact on Women and on People with Disabilities

Women in Nigeria including single mothers and widows continued to experience higher poverty rates compared to men. In 2021, about 43.1 percent of women's unemployment and underemployment rates significantly increased to 51.8% by 2023 affecting their economic empowerment.

- The implication being that access to resources, education, and healthcare continues to be a challenge for women, compounding their vulnerability to poverty.
- Similarly, the disabled community in Nigeria faces heightened levels of poverty, often due to discrimination, lack of accessibility, and limited access to education and employment.
- Available data indicates that individuals with disabilities can experience a poverty rate as high as 85%, facing barriers that prevent equal participation in economic activities. This data highlights ongoing challenges, particularly for marginalized groups such as women and people with disabilities.

Implication Development of Vulnerable on National Development

The development of disabled individuals and women has significant implications for overall national development:




Our micro finance for small medium enterprise (SME)

Focused on over 10 women owners, lending them 100.00 thousand with 5 percent interest returns. This saw a significant positive effect on women's economic empowerment, improving their financial income, capital assets, and positively affecting their family and community contributions.

Our development work at Coite devoir:

Promoting ingenious trade: women and enterprise in Coite devoir

Sustainable development is at the centre of economic priorities; trade has a key role in economic development and providing economic opportunities. In the rural places in Cote devoir, there are high levels of unemployment among young female with low levels of literacy who face education barriers due to poverty. Most young unmarried women we interrogated would like to run their own business and source for micro finance prospects.

Our policy and recommendations

We aim to formulate policies that lift women out of poverty, as most trade policies are genderblind. We focus on gender mainstreaming in trade agreements. We recommend a bottom-up approach that alters national laws, procedures, institutions, culture, and social norms. We advocate for amplifying the voices of indigenous peoples to ensure trade discussions are more inclusive. We aim to strengthen domestic laws and facilitate women's equal active participation in local, national, and international trade.

Increasing women's participation in the labor market to match men's levels could uplift the gross domestic product of most African countries, closing the gender gap. We are calling on women's agencies and governments to consistently include women's economic empowerment in their new economic diversification strategies due to the key role they play.

We advocate for capacity-building programs that consistently promote sustainable development goals and promote technology in small intensive facilities. We are calling for the need to increase women's representation in trade negotiations. We also promote women's access to digital learning, infrastructure, and trade liberalization reform.

What impacts negatively on women's productivity needs to be eliminated, such as liberalization, labor market institutions, property rights, poverty, and family issues.



GENDER INCLUSIVE GOVERNANCE

We heartily congratulate Madame Netumbo Ndemupelila Nandi-Ndaitwah as Namibia's President-elect. We congratulate Namibia and on its historic milestone by electing its first female president. Netumbo Nandi-Ndtwah, her victory represents a remarkable advancement for gender representation in Namibia and Africa as a whole. Nandi-Ndaitwah became known as an advocate for women's rights. In one of her key achievements, she pushed the Combating of Domestic Violence Act through the National Assembly in 2002.



During the CSW/NGO Forum in October 2024, Esther Banquet discussed the hindrances to women's political equal participation in Nigeria due to cultural structures and norms. It is becoming glaring that the fight for gender equality is far-reaching. Gender inequality is still rife in the political arena in the Nigerian context. A culture dominated by men in politics leads to male dominance, which has farreaching consequences. Women find themselves disadvantaged in the power dynamics as a result of social, economic, physical, political, and financial limitations.

Social norms and cultural structures are still strongly a concern. Women's leadership and representation in decision-making roles are critical for advancing gender-inclusive governance. This indicates that their active participation in politics, business, and civil society, as well as their ability to flourish in traditionally male-dominated professions, can ensure that gender issues are resolved, their voices amplified, and that girls' and gender rights are protected globally.

TIMELINE: Nigeria's Heads of State






Central to our mission is supporting marginalized communities and influencing national policies in the UK. We frequently receive invitations from Parliament to engage in policy discussions with MPs.



In 2024, as a civil society organization, we contributed to the CSW/NGO 68 Forum, which brings together global civil society, non-governmental organizations, and feminists. The priority theme for 2024 was "Accelerating the achievement of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls by addressing poverty and strengthening institutions and financing with a gender perspective."

We submitted a written report and facilitated conversation circles on intersecting crises of systemic inequalities in the country we represented. Women living in poverty are disproportionately affected. It is, therefore, with great urgency that experts convene to discuss how to confront complex crises and counter their effects on women living in poverty, sexual abuse, and lack of political representation.

2024 marked a pivotal moment for us to network, engage, and learn about key gender equality issues within the United Nations organization. We made a significant difference within our sphere of influence.

Our policy recommendation emphasizes education as a crucial tool for national development in Nigeria. Having a woman break the glass ceiling in Nigerian politics may require a paradigm shift. Mentorship for emerging leaders may be transitional, but our recommendation requires effective institutional building mechanism strategies.

Key Recommendations:

EDUCATION AS A KEY TOOL TO NATIONAL BUILDING IN NIGERIA

Collaboration and Institutional Reform

We recommend collaboration among institutions and advocacy for reforming constitutional laws, legal structures, and policies that hinder the effectiveness of marginalized groups.

Social Change and Constitution Reform

Women men must work together as agents of social change to advocate for constitutional reforms.

Good Governance and Cultural Shifts

Governments and models must demonstrate good governance systems and mechanisms to tackle cultural biases.

Women's Leadership Capacity Building

Mentorship for emerging leaders:

Activities can include funding programmes which equip feminist leaders with skills to mobilize communities towards shifting social norms through advocacy and coalition building.

This may also include the use of innovative technologies to engage with young activists and encourage young women's political engagement and participation. Youth-led organisations are highly encouraged to apply as the lead organisation and/or be included as associate member involved in implementation

Education and Social Norms

Education is a powerful tool for leveraging convening powers to shift social norms. Strategic partners can work together to eliminate all forms of discrimination against women and girls.

Education as a powerful tool in leverage convening powers for social norms

strategic partners in eliminating all forms of discrimination against women and girls, by understanding and addressing unequal power relations, gender stereotypes and practices that perpetuate discrimination, combating gendered disinformation and supporting the design and implementation of policies and programmes that address the roles and responsibilities of men and boys in transforming negative social norms and attitudes.

Education by institutional building that reinforce feminist movement:

Through lead organizations should ensure they are engaging in direct sub-partnering with additional civil society partners to best deliver the intended results.

Increasing women's political leadership

Organizations should consider implementation strategies which aim to increase the opportunities for women leaders to engage in consultations around new policies and legislations. This can also include creating knowledge and evidence around women's political leadership.

Our work focuses on empowering youths in decision-making. The Excel Leadership Academy's pioneer project in Lagos offers a 12-month mentoring program for youths entering governance and public life, enabling talent acquisition and leadership development.



Challenges Encountered in Participation:

Our report, which focused on working with youths to promote decision-making, observed the following scenarios:

- 1 Young people's ability to actively participate in policy dialogues can be hindered by obstacles such as limited access to essential information and resources.
- Age, financial, and educational criteria may hinder young individuals from entering policy-making institutions or running for office.
- Authorities or other actors may use repression, intimidation, or assault to prevent young activists from advocating for policy change, leading to fear and preventing political participation.

- Youth movements and organizations may fragment due to diverse opinions and interests, making it challenging to coordinate policy advocacy and action.
- Cultural and Social Norms: Cultural and social norms may deter young people, especially girls and young women, from politics and public affairs. Gender stereotypes and discrimination can limit their leadership and involvement.
- 6 Low-income and rural youth may face additional barriers to engagement due to limited resources, opportunities, and support networks.

DESPITE LAWS, PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES SUFFERING NON-INCLUSION, RIGHTS' ABUSE — STAKEHOLDERS

Some stakeholders have decried that, in spite of the requisite laws, persons with disabilities (PWDs) continue to suffer discrimination, lack of inclusion, and abuse of their rights. The stakeholders, which include community leaders, legal practitioners, educators, and health practitioners, expressed this reservation at a seminar for PWDs organised by a non-governmental organisation, Esther Banquet International, in Ondo, Ondo State.

Setting the tone for the event, the Chief Executive Officer of Esther Banquet International, Mrs Anne-Wonder Fasan, said evidence showed that there was little advancement in the inclusion of PWDs in the affairs of the nation, not minding the existence of relevant policies.



Represented by the project manager, Mr. Adebola Adebamowo, she bemoaned that the gap was becoming wider as PWDs and special needs families faced obstacles in accessing government funding and support. She said efforts must be particularly geared towards empowering marginalized groups in Nigeria and ensuring their active involvement in all levels of decision-making. A community leader in Ondo Kingdom, Chief Ayo Akingbule, said only a few PWDs are considered for political offices, questioning why PWDs cannot have a ministerial or commissionership position in government. Keynote speaker, Dr. Bridget Awosika, stressed that, no matter the circumstance, persons living with disabilities must learn skills and be self-employed. Another keynote speaker, Barrister Moruf Bada, pointed to the 2018 Discrimination Against Persons with Disabilities (Prohibition) Act as one that advocates for the inclusion of PWDs in the planning, organizing, forecasting, scheduling of buildings. He charged the government, individuals, and organizations to ensure that PWDs live a life of dignity, respect, and full participation in our society, as it is in several other countries that respect the rights of people with disabilities. In his own remarks, a senior medical officer at the University of Medical Science Teaching Hospital (UNIMED) Ondo, Dr. Udi Samuel, advised people with disabilities not to joke with their health or their well-being. He emphasized the need for them to engage in regular physical exercise to put their bones and muscles to use, saying that unused bones become weak and can lead to untimely death. Furthermore, Udi enjoined PWDs to regularly check their health status and maintain a balanced diet.



These challenges include violence against widows, harmful traditional practices and beliefs, religious limitations, lack of access to property rights and finance, and inheritance issues.

As an organization, we learned about and explored best practices and legal frameworks, such as CEDAW and UN SCR 1325, and other shared practices. By understanding government initiatives and challenges, we can advocate for more effective support systems for widows.

Our policy recommendations for improving the landscape in supporting widows and promoting a welfare society are as follows:

- Government Programs and Policies: Provide financial assistance to widows, including pension and insurance benefits.
- Widow's Pension Scheme: Monthly stipend for widows below the poverty line.

This is a recognition that people want to give something back and create improved social capital, improved aspirations that most public services haven't designed in ways that mobilize diverse groups and talent.
